



“FAITH5” Suggestion for Devotions

FAITH5 (Faith Acts in the Home) is a simple, easy-to-implement faith practice, perfect for incorporating into your daily routine and takes about five to fifteen minutes per day. When done over time, FAITH5 carries the power to enrich communication, deepen understanding, aid sleep, and promote mental, physical and spiritual health. Here are the five steps of the FAITH5:



SHARE your highs and lows from the day.



READ a bible verse or story.



TALK about how the bible reading might relate to your highs and lows.



PRAY for one another's highs and lows.



BLESS one another.

Ten years ago, in January, I got my first tattoo. No, it's not a Mom, a creature, a mural and no, I didn't have to worry if all the names were spelled correctly.

It was four little blue dots. I was about to start my series of 33 radiation treatments after my breast cancer diagnosis.

For each of these treatments, you lay down on a bed, the nurses position the machine, connecting the dots. They leave, zap you and then return to reposition the machine. There you are just laying there, looking up at ceiling tile that is made to look like a flower garden. Where does your mind go? Each day you think, is this really going to work? Is it going to make it worse?

Hard to imagine, but I talked the whole time they were with me. As the nurses left the room, I never felt so alone. What to do? Pray!! When they left, they would let me know to stay still (another thing, I am not too good at), I started the Lord's Prayer. When I finished, they were back to readjust and then left again saying, "Mary, stay still," and I started the Lord's Prayer.

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Sunday, September 22, 2019 continued

End of second prayer, end of treatment. This few minutes each day gave me courage, strength and the faith that God was with me and will get me through no matter the outcome.

This year marked the tenth anniversary of my last treatment. But each time I say the Lord's Prayer I am thankful for Him being with me at the time and realize He was with me through all the other peaks and valleys through my life.

Gracious and loving God, thank you for being with us. Knowing you are there is the strength we rely on throughout our lives. Knowing your love and the peace it brings is the most wonderful gift we can receive. Amen.

**Luke 19:8-10 8 Zacchaeus said to the Lord, “Look, half of my possessions, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much.” 9 Then Jesus said, “Today salvation has come to this house... 10 For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost.”
(For the whole story, read Luke 19:1-10)**

How would you describe your relationship with money? As a working college and seminary student, words like stressful and tight budget would have come to mind. The call to stewardship, at least when it came to financial resources, did not seem like it could possibly apply to me; sort of like when your college calls and asks you to donate while you are still paying them interest on your loans. God’s work in my heart on this subject reminds me of the story of Zacchaeus.

I carried some guilt about not practicing what I was preaching in seminary when it came to stewardship and tithing; so, I started to peek at what Jesus had to say like Zacchaeus did as he climbed the sycamore tree to peer over the crowd and get a look at Jesus. I read books, Scripture, and had conversations with fellow people of faith. I was still trying to keep my distance, though, just looking and not doing.

Jesus did not keep his distance, though. As Zacchaeus peered over the crowd, Jesus looked up, called his name, and told Zacchaeus to climb down because Jesus was going to stay at his house that day and the experience changed Zacchaeus’ life. Just as Jesus followed Zacchaeus home, Jesus followed me out of those books, Scripture, and conversations. He followed me into one particular conversation where Max and I were discussing what to do for our Lenten practice. In a clearly Holy Spirit moment, we decided to give back to those who had been generous towards us when we needed it most.

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Wednesday, September 25, 2019 continued

One of my favorite ways we gave back was sending my sister and her husband, who had opened their home to us, on date nights. This practice changed our hearts and our life. Now when I think of our relationship with money, stress can come up, but words and phrases like opportunity to make change, joining in God's work, and taking care of what God gave us are what come to mind. Jesus taught us that this call to stewardship is not about giving because God said so, it's about God gifting us with the life-giving opportunity to join in the work that God is up to.

God is up to something through this capital campaign. Your participation shows that when we prayerfully envisioned the ministry God could call us to without the burden of debt, we peered at what Jesus had to say and Jesus followed you home just like he did Zaccheaus.

Gracious God, we give thanks for all you have provided and for the call to look to the future ministry of faith at Sharon Lutheran Church. Guide our stewardship of all the gifts you provide in our individual lives, as well as our shared gifts as a community. Make clear the ways you are inviting us to be your hands and feet. Amen.

Many of my childhood memories are associated with Elk Valley Lutheran Church in rural McCanna, ND, where my family and I were members. I love everything about Elk Valley; it was where I was baptized as an infant, confirmed as a teenager, and where I elected to be married years later. Most importantly, that little country church nestled in trees near “Bachelors Grove” was where I first learned about the gift of faith.

As with most Lutheran churches, we had weekly Sunday School where all the classes gathered together in the sanctuary for a time to sing and share offerings. One of our Sunday School leaders would end our time together with Genesis 31:49: “May the Lord watch over you and me while we are absent from one another.” I liked hearing that verse, probably because it was short and to the point which made it easy to recognize and memorize! I also liked hearing it because it was said with conviction and a warm smile from our leader who had a way of making eye contact with all of us rambunctious kids in that beautiful sanctuary.

As confirmation students we were asked to talk about our favorite scripture and explore what those verses meant to us. I remember talking about Genesis 31:49 and how it was given as a blessing before we left to join our Sunday School class. Our Pastor leading confirmation class explained that this blessing and words of that scripture were to be carried with us throughout the week, no matter what was happening at school or home. That brought me a measure of comfort then, and still does today, as I think about loved ones who are no longer with us, those who are struggling with illness and despair, and with my family and friends who I am absent from more often than what I would like.

Just as I am blessed to be a member of Sharon today, I am grateful for that little church in the country, the people who gave of their time and talents to share that scripture and teachings with me, the pastors who helped lead me on a faith journey, and my parents who lived out their faith by bringing me to church and living a life of faithfulness and compassion. Those gifts given to me at a young age are with me always and are

I returned to regular church attendance when I moved to Grand Forks and ended up at Sharon Lutheran Church after Kathy Fick and Laurie Natwick gave me Lutheran lessons during the lunch hour at Christus Rex.

The Sharon Lutheran Senior Choir is one of my many blessings in the church. Talented conductors and pianists, along with positive and humorous choir members, helped me through stressful times; they are truly my mental health fix each week. In addition, I love working with the funeral committee and the lefse committee where I met new people who are generous and loving in their commitment to Sharon. One of my pleasures is to read scriptures during the church services, it reminds me of reading scripture to my family around the dinner table so long, long ago.

I have gotten away from it over the years, but I still have it, though now it is in a plastic bag so that I don't lose the pages that have fallen off from use and age.

I still don't consider myself a great Christian. I have so many failings and doubts about this world. I think we all have doubts when we see the horrible things that happen. But our hope is still in Christ and knowing that He can overcome anything that this world puts in our way and He did so with humility and confidence that God would be there for Him. We are loved and blessed by God and we are blessed to be in a community that is so caring and generous with their time and talents and their finances.

If only more “teachable moments” could show more instant results as in this case! They say that most teachers aren’t in our careers for the income; we’re here for the outcome, which is often unseen and immeasurable.

Now that I’m retired, I don’t feel homesick often, but I do miss loved ones who are no longer here. I grieve for them, but I try to remember the gifts they brought to my life, thanking God for putting people in our lives when we need each other. Whatever longing or suffering we feel now will be transformed into great joy someday.

Dear God, thank you for your love and support. I’ve learned that to love is to risk and be vulnerable. There’s comfort in knowing that You have prepared a place for us and that we will meet again! In Jesus’ name we pray. Amen.

Monday, October 7, 2019

For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.”

Matthew 6:21

I don't know about you, but it sure seems clear that God's ways are so often counter-intuitive. And nowhere, perhaps, is that more persistently evident than in Scripture - in God's Word. In fact, these words from Jesus are such words for me. I would have said it differently. I think I would have made a statement about giving, about generosity, about treasure, exactly the opposite: "For where your heart is, there will your treasure be also." You know, whatever are the things of your heart, surely your resources, support and treasure will follow. Makes sense, right? But that's not what Jesus says. He says that our hearts follow our treasure.

I remember being at a faith conference once when the presenter was speaking on money - on giving. He asked us to take out our checkbooks (shows you how long-ago it was!) and to hold on to them as he was speaking with us about a very personal matter - our own giving of treasure. He said that our checkbook registers told the truth about what was important to us. He said that many of us said that God's Kingdom, the ways of Christ, the work of the church, were all important to us. Or that the Lord's work was where our heart was. Yet he said the truth was that it was likely not as accurate as we would like to believe. And he said that the problem was that too many of us were waiting to feel moved, to have something touch our hearts, before we would be generous. And that's when he suggested that we had it all backward. Give, he said, and your heart will follow. That's how it works.

The church is the Body of Christ, and each one of us are members of that Body - members of the church (1st Cor. 12:27). We're a motley crew, in some ways. We're most certainly imperfect, challenged, seemingly without much that we might need, struggling to be "up to the task." And yet, we are exactly who God says we are - God's holy people (Deut. 7:6), His light - a city on a hill (Matt. 5:14), chosen (Deut. 14:2), and part of God's household (Eph. 2:19). Being generous, giving of our treasure, all demonstrate that we trust God's ways and power. And that the church - our church - is exactly where it is that God intends to work faith, miracles and new life! So, our treasures, for the work of Christ's church, will lead our hearts, as well.

Lord, help me to more deeply trust you. Everything that I have has come from you. You have provided for me all along; you will continue to do so. May my treasure reflect my faith in you. And may my heart follow into the joy of your love. Amen.

Tuesday, October 8, 2019
